- Approves Niagara Region's HHAP work plan
- Provides knowledge and guidance for Plan-Do-Study-Act (PDSA) improvement projects to support with the

implementation of Niagara Region's CA system Built For Zero (BFZ) Home Team Committee

- Meets monthly throughout the year
- Supports Niagara Region in moving forward with action items and implementation of best practices throughout the system
- Reviews Niagara's participation with BFZ and reviews of Niagara's score cards
- Assists in developing policy to move forward CA in Niagara Region

The governance of these tables is integral to the development of Coordinated Access. As Niagara Region continues our journey we will be focused on ensuring policy and governance are clearly documented as we develop our Coordinated Access guide. Niagara Region is working closely with these groups to finish our guide and roll it out to the community; we believe that by the end of March 2022 Niagara Region will have met all of the Reaching Home requirements for Coordinated Access.

We are showing a target higher than the 2020-21 value because we are working toward higher numbers of move ins to permanent housing. Our hope is that an absolute value of 200 in 2027-28 still represents a lower recidivism rate to homelessness from housing than we experienced in 2020-21.

Indigenous identity is obviously underreported in HIFIS, given our Point-in-Time Count experience where almost a quarter of individuals identify as Indigenous. Therefore, we expect that this value will increase over time before we successfully reduce Indigenous homelessness. A target of 249 Indigenous individuals in 2027-28, expecting that this will no longer be an underreported value, would represent a significant reduction in Indigenous homelessness considering that the actual 2020-21 value is likely closer to 640 if Indigenous identity were not underreported.
